• Cochrane Collaboration reviews irradiation-induced cognitive impairments in brain tumour patients.

'The Cochrane Collaboration has published a systematic review that assesses the effectiveness of interventions for preventing and ameliorating radiotherapy-related cognitive impairments. Key review findings include that donepezil may help patients with primary brain tumours who receive radiation therapy.'

• IBTA advisor writes about four radical therapies that could treat his brain tumour

'In last week's New Scientist, IBTA's Digital Technology Advisor, Dr Stuart Farrimond, writes about four new glioblastoma therapies (Nanotherm, NovoTTF-100A, DCVax and VB-111) and their potential to treat his brain tumour in the future.'

• Surviving Terminal Cancer film premieres in London, New York and online

"Surviving Terminal Cancer" is a documentary following the story of Ben Williams (a glioblastoma survivor who was diagnosed in 1995) and other long term brain tumour survivors. This privately-funded film premiered in London on February 4th; New York on February 18th, and is now available for free streaming online.'

a tool to let US patients find local surgeons with expertise in using new surgical technologies and approaches.'

• Cancer drug first tested on dogs to enter human trials

'A phase I clinical trial of a potential new glioblastoma treatment, PAC-1, has started recruiting patients. The drug, which was first tested on dog malignancies, appears to penetrate the blood-brain barrier and is expected to work alongside other cancer treatments.'

• Improving doctor-patient communication: clinical study now recruiting

A study evaluating communication between physicians, glioblastoma patients, and caregivers is now recruiting participants at three locations in New York and New Jersey, USA. The study will look at how oncologists can best provide information about brain tumours, results and treatments. Read more.

- <u>Cross posted from SickKids Canada:</u> Researchers at SickKids Canada undertook a retrospective study of children's outcomes with Rhabdoid brain tumours, and found that in patient's with particular gene expression profiles, high-dose chemotherapy without radiation improved survival by 40 to 50 percent over the standard chemotherapy and radiation treatment: 'The study is published in the April 14 online edition of The Lancet Oncology'. http://tinyurl.com/ocgkrya

Update on Optune

The mystery of the reaction to the Optune (formerly the "NovaCure TTFields therapy" device) Phase III trial results as a first-line treatment of glioblastoma continues, with no further statements from the larger research/advocacy brain tumour organisations since December.

Reaction to the BTAA special announcement of November

(http://tinyurl.com/npop78m) on the results from 2014 SNO Annual Scientific Meeting were generally muted, not least from the long-suffering BTAA management committee which again remarked on the importance of being shown drafts before sending BTAA eNews editions (sorry again colleagues!....).

A summary of the various remarks from other readers, some of whom were clinicians, is as follows:

- There was no indication the company was pressing approval in Australia, at least that this stage.
- The use of the device and/or the device itself is extraordinarily expensive, at least as of the minute.
- The extent of benefit has not yet been demonstrated, despite FDA agreeing to the early termination of the trial.

• The proposed strategy in the eNews was "interesting" (Note: When someone says they think something is "interesting", and don't elaborate, you can probably guess that they are in fact not at all interested in it).

However, there were a few favourable responses to the proposed strategy to get Australian patients access to Optune, all of which were from patients/survivors.

The company announced in late December that Optune was available at over <u>150</u> <u>treatment centres in the USA</u>. In late March, it announced that Optune had been <u>approved for use in Japan</u>: 'Approval allows for rapid, direct commercial market access in Japan, the world's second largest medical device market'. The whole situation seems a bit mysterious, but more information will inevitably come out sooner or later.
